Building/Structure Inventory Forms

These forms, many of which date from the 1970s and 1980s, include information about a building or structure (i.e. a barn), including a name by which the building is known, address, present owner, original and present use, building material and structural system, condition, notes on related outbuildings, property, and surroundings, notable features, and notes on the historical and architectural significance of the building. The form may include a small map

of the property and/or a photograph of the building. The buildings documented are **not** limited to properties that have been recognized on state or national historic registers.

Locations covered in our library: Schenectady, Eastern Avenue, Glenville, Niskayuna, Rotterdam, Princetown.

Applications for Historic Markers

These materials consist of application materials submitted to the Schenectady County Historical Society for historic markers. Many of the applications refer to properties in the Stockade, although there are also applications for buildings in other parts of the city and county.

Maps and Atlases

Sanborn Maps

These detailed maps offer information about building material and structure, street address, and other building features.

Editions in our library: City of Schenectady – 1884, 1889, 1892, 1894, 1900 (updated to 1912), 1914 (updated to 1924 and 1929), 1930 (updated to 1949/1961). Rotterdam Junction – 1913.

City/County Atlases

These atlases include some building material information, street numbers, and sometimes owner or resident names.

Editions in our library: Schenectady County (incl. city) – 1866. City of Schenectady – 1880, 1892, 1905.

Directories

City directories offer an alphabetical listing of residents, their occupations and addresses. Directories also include guides to local businesses and amenities and a guide to current streets. Beginning in 1930, directories include a section of listings by street address in addition to an alphabetical listing. Library volunteers have also constructed listings by street address for a few of the earliest directories.

Some directories only include the city of Schenectady; many include Scotia and some include other towns in Schenectady County. See city directory list on library shelf for more details about years and localities covered.

Years covered in our library: 1841, 1857-1858, 1860-1968, 1980, 1984.

Tax Lists / Assessment Rolls

Copies of a number of colonial-era tax lists can be found in the clipping file. We also have copies of the 1813, 1816, and 1910 assessment rolls for Schenectady and the following tax/assessment rolls for Duaneburg (1836, 1840, 1841, 1844, 1849, 1858, 1859, 1862, 1864, 1866, 1868, 1873, 1878, 1882, 1885-1889, 1891, 1892, 1894, 1900-1904, 1907) and Glenville (1821, 1822, 1828).

Wills

When conducting deed research, you may find a gap in the chain of title. Wills can sometimes help to fill in these gaps of ownership. They also provide useful biographical information and might include information about a house, furniture, or other property. Our library has Schenectady County wills on microfilm for the years 1809-1901. Additionally, you may find copies of wills in the Historic Manuscripts Collection or in a surname file. Our library also has some published abstracts of wills.

You can also find wills, probate records, and letters of administration in the Schenectady County Surrogate's Court.

Albany County Records

Schenectady County was established in 1809; prior to that date, Schenectady and its surrounding towns were part of Albany County. We have in our library a collection of large ledgers that index Albany County deeds, mortgages, and maps from this time period. The original documents may be found at the Albany County Hall of Records.

Photograph Collections

Although we do not have item-level indexing for all of our photographs, lists of headings of folders in our photograph collections are available. Some historic houses have their town files; otherwise, seek photos of your street, neighborhood, farm, or town. In some cases, photographs of a home or farm may be included with photos of a particular family under the surname photograph listing.

Additionally, we have in our holdings a series of photographs taken of every property in the Stockade in 1962, when the neighborhood was designated a historic district.

Clipping Files and Surname Files

Clipping files consist of a variety of photocopied information – mostly newspaper articles, occasionally photocopies of original documents and photographs or compiled histories – about a topic. Lists of file headings for the city and county are available. Some helpful categories include streets, neighborhoods, businesses, tax lists, ethnic groups, fires/floods, ghosts. Surname files provide biographical and genealogical information; occasionally, they may also include information about a house, farm, or business associated with a person or family.

Census Records

Federal and New York State Census records are a great resource for finding biographical information about residents of a home. In the context of house histories, they may provide information about the building material and assessed value of a home, and tell whether the occupants rent or own the home. Census information can also show whether there were one or more units in the building or provide agricultural information. Looking at the census entries in context can also provide information about the demographic makeup of the neighborhood or community.

Our library has microfilm copies of most New York State and Federal Censuses, along with a number of printed indexes and transcriptions. We also have a subscription to online services which offer searchable, digital access to census records.

Historic Manuscripts Collection

The Historic Manuscripts Collection comprises many of the original documents in our collections prior to the 20th century. This collection, which includes deeds, wills, legal matters, correspondence, accounts, and other documents, is indexed by name in our card catalog.

Other than deeds and other land-related records, Vault Book (VB) 79 is especially useful for house history researchers. VB 79 is a ledger of real estate information compiled by Fitch and Griffes, an insurance and real estate company in Schenectady, from 1870 to 1880. It has been indexed by address.

Selected Personal Papers and Business Records

Jonathan Pearson Street Books

These books of street history and land ownership information were compiled by 19th-century historian Jonathan Pearson. The books include references to deeds, sketch maps of streets, and other information.

James Frost Papers

Collects the papers of James Frost (1783-1851), a surveyor who worked in Albany, Schenectady, Montgomery, and Schoharie counties. James Frost worked mostly near the Duanesburg area. The papers include copies of survey sketches and notes, maps, and other materials related to Frost's work.

Lewis Sebring Field Books

Collects 91 field books of surveyor and civil engineer Lewis Sebring (1868-1950). There is a ledger index to the field books. The information in the field books can be challenging to make use of, as most of the information consists of short notations. Sketches indicate distances and may occasionally include nearby property owners' names, roads, bodies of water, or other landmarks.

Schenectady County Real Property Tax Service Agency (or find via Google search)

This site is very helpful in giving information about a property and getting started with deed research.

To use the site to begin researching the chain of ownership of a property:

At the left side of the screen, click on “ImageMate Online.”

At the bottom of the screen, click on access from a non-County network computer.

Enter the number and street/route name in the form and click “Search.”

You will be taken to a screen with information about the property. On the left side of the screen, click on “View parcel history data.”

If there are recent sales of the property, they will be listed here. For more information, click “property record card” at the bottom of the screen.

This will bring you to a scanned card showing transactions regarding the property. The most recent owner will be listed at the bottom of the card. The card shows dates that the property changed hands and gives the book (“Liber”) and page on which the appropriate deeds can be found at the Schenectady County Clerk’s Office.
