1	14 Mar 1914	C.P. Steinmetz to J.H. Embey, Commissioner of Education, Albany NY. Letter in favor of the proposed amendment to the education law by providing for a Department of Public Instruction in the City of Schenectady, in its original submitted form. Original charter allowed women as well as men to hold office as school commissioners. " apparently by some influence hostile to women's participation in education, the Charter was changed so as to exclude women. Without considering the question of women's suffrage – regarding which opinions may differ, it is obvious that women are equally, if not more than men, interested in the education of children." Also objects to an addition that fixes pay for teachers. "Considering, that the pay of many of our school teachers, to whom we entrust the education of our children, is materially less than that of the uneducated foreign street laborers, such a state of affairs would be insufferable." Also recommends having School Commissioners elected, rather than appointed by mayor.

For these reasons I consider women's suffrage as necessary for the maintenance of our civilization, and therefore as inevitable." See 134 above.

Steinmetz "shall be glad to assist, in any manner, as consulting engineer", Stock of \$4000 should be divided evenly among 5 syndicate managers. Suggests Mr. Schmidt as chairman. Other syndicate members appear to be Mr. Dey and Mr. Parshall. "Since you have been always so essentially successful and efficient in commercial work, in introducing new things and getting people enthuses, that I do not think we can spare you for mere administrative office, but will have to rely upon you to bring the result of development before the public." "We shall be glad to hear now when you desire to have the first payment made." [See Electric Vehicles April 1915, p. 137. Harry Dey, an electrical engineer, designed a simple lightweight electric drive for electric vehicles, and an innovative control system for it. . Steinmetz, one of an 8-person syndicate backing the idea, predicted publicly that this vehicle should be able to compete in price with "the cheap but good gasoline car." He is quoted at length enthusiastically endorsing the proposed vehicle. It appears that price never got below \$950, and company ceased in 1917, with an attempted revival 1919-1925]

If we really believe in social <u>democracy</u>, then we must accept the decision of the majority of socialists.</p> <p>I wish you would reconsider the matter. There are undeniable marked differences of opinion on America's attitude in the present European war, amongst those different classes of American citizens who have proven their citizenship and cannot justly be accused of subordinating America's interests to those of England, or of Germany. it was of interest to me therefore to look into and try to estimate from the available data - however meager they may be... the racial constitution of America of today, and the results were rather interesting - startling to some extent, though when comparing the conclusions with the social, political and other changes which have taken place during the last few generations, there is a marked agreement, which in my opinion tends to corroborate the estimates of the racial change. The conclusion, which to many might appear unexpected, but which hardly can be denied any more, would be, that America is not an Anglo-Saxon nation any more, but comprises a mixture of races, of which none even approaches a majority."

That is, production pays a tax which is used by society to finance future production, the amount being merely such as is required to maintain the integrity of the existing means of production, and provide for their increase with increasing civilization (and production). There would then be no demand any more for private capital.... This is socialism. How this will be brought about is the natural development of our industrial civilization, nobody can predict but we can only imagine: whether gradually by the dropping of the rate of interest, or by the increasing strength and ability, and increasing entrance of the government into the industries as competitor with private capital, or by the extension of the principle of supervision and control by government commissions, etc. "</p>
